




·THE·EMPERORS·



What led the Romans to build so many foricae?








Pantheon's rotunda. Years later, when it was
about half a millennium old, Pope Boniface IV
had it turned into a Catholic church. In the eyes
of the pope, this increased the Pantheon's value,
so it'd have enough funding for repairs & general
upkeep (it helped when the Roman gods' tag-
